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Program Update

The North American Defense and Security Academic Alliance (NADSAA) program is completing its inaugural year and we are extremely pleased with the growth the program has experienced and the level of participation we have enjoyed from our partners.

Most significantly, we have just concluded the first cycle of the Volunteer Student Internship Program (VSIP) here in the headquarters and this effort has met with resounding success throughout the Commands. We placed 12 exceptional students from a wide array of colleges and universities across several directorates and special staff offices and the feedback we've received from the intern supervisors has exceeded all of our expectations. We have received applications from 5 students for our winter 2019 VSIP cycle are currently accepting applications for next year's internship opportunities. Thank you for referring such exceptional students to this program! We will continue to work closely with the NORAD and USNORTHCOM staff to find the most challenging and rewarding internship opportunities for your students going forward.

We are also thankful for the research support we have been receiving from both military and civilian institutions. This year we had 7 students dedicate their efforts toward N&NC research topics of interest and we had several others express interest. Throughout the coming year we will be working on establishing a Research and Writing award program that should provide more incentive for your students to look to N&NC for potential thesis topics and other research related endeavors.

Finally, the 3rd leg of the NADSAA triad, interactivity, is starting to gel in accordance with the program's vision. We had university research teams visit the

headquarters this year and also provided subject matter expert support from our headquarters to university sponsored workshops. We anticipate continued growth in this area and intend to develop a guest speaker series to complement the other interactivity efforts.

Our partnership efforts have yielded exceptional results this year and continues to grow. We would like to thank all of the institutions that have opted to participate in the NADSAA efforts and we look forward to continuing to work with all alliance members while we continue to expand this burgeoning program.

NORAD and USNORTHCOM Volunteer Student Internship Program (N&NC VSIP)

N&NC VSIP provides students exposure to NORAD and USNORTHCOM missions and responsibilities, while working alongside current military and civilian professionals dedicated to the defense of North America.

Participants in N&NC VSIP gain valuable hands-on experience related to their education endeavors while working in a joint, interagency and international environment at NORAD and USNORTHCOM. Students may potentially earn academic credit for the work performed and those that qualify may receive a Department of Defense SECRET clearance.

Summer 2018 VSIP Interns

In June NORAD and USNORTHCOM welcomed 12 student interns. The summer 2018 VSIP class is made up of nine civilian graduate level students from NADSAA member institutions and three USARMY ROTC Cadets direct from USARMY Cadet Command. This group is currently hard at work within our headquarters on Peterson Air Force Base in Colorado Springs, Colorado.

We've placed all 12 student interns across the NORAD and USNORTHCOM Joint Staff and they are currently working within our Strategic Policy and Plans, Interagency, Logistics and Engineering, Operations, Training and Exercises, and Requirements, Analysis and Resources Directorates. Several of our summer interns have found their experiences to be so enriching that they are extending their summer internships into the fall.



Applications: We are currently accepting applications for internships beginning in January 2019 and June 2019

- The window for **January 2019** applications will be has been extended until 31 August
- > June 2019 applications will be accepted until 30 November 2018

Student Requirements for Program Consideration:

- ✓ Open to civilian graduate level students and select ROTC / service academy cadets*
- ✓ Students must be available to work a minimum of 9 weeks in the program (work schedules will vary)
- ✓ Students will undergo a background investigation for a Department of Defense SECRET clearance
- ✓ Students must be currently enrolled at an accredited academic instruction and obtain and maintain a GPA of 2.5 on a 4.0 scale

*To be considered for internship appointment, undergraduate ROTC and Service Academy Cadets must hold a minimum DOD SECRET clearance

Writing Program Updates


This year, National Intelligence University (NIU)'s Bachelor of Science in Intelligence program utilized five NORAD and USNORTHCOM research topics as final Capstone projects. For an entire semester, teams of 5-6 NIU students conducted research on behalf of the commands and in culmination of their research traveled to the NORAD and USNORTHCOM Headquarters in April 2018. A student representative from each topic area in tandem with an assigned NIU professor met with NORAD and USNORTHCOM Subject Matter Experts (SMEs) to refine and assist in the final stages of their projects.

In June 2018 the NIU students presented their final projects via video conference to our SMEs, who were eager to review their findings and final deliverable projects. The research conducted by these NIU students has directly contributed to the missions of NORAD and USNORTHCOM. In addition, we've received a number of papers from students at NADSAAA member institutions to include the Naval

Postgraduate School. Our research and writing program continues to grow and we receive weekly inquiries from students interested in assisting with research.

As a reminder, we do request that final paper submissions undergo a thorough editing process to include grammar and punctuation.

All research papers submitted from the annual topics list will automatically compete for the annual NADSAA writing award (currently under development). Each submission will be reviewed by a panel of defense and security experts from across the NORAD and USNORTHCOM staff and winners will be invited to present their research findings at our headquarters as well as recommended for publication within an existing military journal.

This two day workshop exposed those in attendance to updates to the NORAD and USNORTHCOM missions and the latest challenges and experiences faced by our defense and security practitioners.

As an effort to give the JTEAW more of a "workshop" forum in which Homeland Defense/Homeland Security educators share ideas, lessons learned and network amongst themselves and NORAD and USNORTHCOM staff, this year's event included an hour long session in which several educators presented current initiatives at their respective academic institutions. This session was well received by all attendees and NORAD and USNORTHCOM staff.

JTEAW's purpose is to provide annual updates to academic institutions who teach subjects related to command missions in order to ensure curricula are kept relevant and current. - Curricula support: NORAD and USNORTHCOM may provide subject matter expertise in support of curriculum validation/revision
- Subject Matter Experts from academia provide presentations at NORAD and USNORTHCOM headquarters
